Asian & Pacific Islanders (APIs) are disproportionately infected with hepatitis B, the leading cause of liver cancer. An estimated 1 in 10 APIs is chronically infected, yet symptoms do not appear until it's almost too late. San Francisco has the highest rate of liver cancer in the U.S. because of its high API population.
